The Graduate School of Foreign Language Education and Research Studies accepts those who have the following knowledge and skills, abilities of thinking, judgement, and expression, and proactive attitudes deserving for the graduate school students according to the Diploma Policy and the Curriculum Policy of the Graduate School:

- 1. To have high foreign language proficiency, intercultural competency, and to have the basic knowledge and skills as bachelors in the fields of foreign language education, intercultural communication, and interpretation and translation studies.
- 2. To have a certain period of experience as professional foreign language teachers, and willingness to review critically their own experiences in order to improve their performances, and to discover and solve various problems in the workplace.
- 3. To have strong willingness to study proactively in one of the programs of foreign language education, intercultural communication, and interpretation and translation studies.

Ph.D. Degree Program

The Graduate School of Foreign Language Education and Research Studies accepts those who have the following knowledge and skills, capacities and proactive attitudes according to the Diploma Policy and the Curriculum Policy of the Graduate School:

- 1. To have high foreign language proficiency and deep understanding of cross-cultural communication, to have mastered the basic expertise for foreign language education in the master's programs in the fields of foreign language education, and also to have enough research and practical experience.
- 2. To be able to conduct interdisciplinary research through the use of the "Think and Practice" capabilities, and to disseminate their research results at home and abroad.
- 3. To have strong willingness and wholesome research ideas to research proactively and independently.

Master's Degree Program: International Students Entrance Examination (October Examination, December Examination and February Examination)

1. Qualification

Applicants must satisfy one of the following 5 conditions:

(including applicants who are expected to satisfy one of the conditions (1) \sim (4) shown below before enrolling in the Graduate School)

- (1) Applicants who have completed a regular 16-year program of school education outside Japan (Note 1).
- (2) Applicants who have graduated from Japanese universities as international students.
- (3) Applicants who have completed a 3-year or longer-program and have been awarded a degree by an overseas university or school (see Note 2 below) that is recognized as being equivalent to a Bachelor's degree.
 - (2016 ordinance of the Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology, No. 19)
- (4) Applicants who have completed a Specialized Course at a MEXT[†] designated Japanese Special Training School as an international student after the designated date. The training school must satisfy the conditions set by MEXT, including that the length of term required for graduation be at least four years.
 - † MEXT: Japanese Ministry of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology
- (5) Applicants who, through a Pre-qualification Individual Screening for Entrance Examination of the Graduate School, are recognized as having scholastic abilities equivalent, or superior, to graduates of the university (This requirement shall not apply to those who do not have Japanese citizenship, but who are recognized as having completed a regular Japanese school education program.).
 - Note 1: Those who have received their education from one of the following are considered to have the equivalent qualification to (1) above, as long as the total period is less than four years.
 - · Elementary schools, junior high schools, high schools, etc. that are run in accordance with Japanese school education law
 - · Foreign schools in Japan
 - · Overseas educational facilities that are accredited, or have been designated, by the Minister of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology
 - Note 2: Such universities or schools shall be evaluated by an organization approved by a relevant official institution in the country of origin for their education and research activities, or recognized as such by the Minister of Education, Culture, Sports, Science and Technology.

Remote Learning System [For Master's Degree Program]

In order to better meet the diverse needs of those enrolled in our Master's program and to expand opportunities for learning and research, the Graduate School of Foreign Language Education has set up a remote learning system for the fields of Foreign Language Education (English language related research only) and Translation and Interpreting Studies.

It is therefore possible for students who find commuting to university difficult due to work commitments or because they live far away to complete their Master's degree program by taking courses online.

In addition to the standard two-year course, students can complete the three-year course using the remote learning system. However, it is not possible to complete the Aston DD Program and the Japanese Language Education Specialist Training Course online because they include participation in face-to-face classes.

Students who use the remote learning system can take classes from their home or workplace using an Internet-based application. Most classes can be taken remotely, with a few exceptions due to the nature of the content of the classes. Even the final (oral) examination can be taken remotely.

There is no special entrance examination for those who wish to use the remote enrolment system. Instead, selection will be made using the existing (face-to-face) entrance exam. No quota is set for the remote learning system.

Use of the remote learning system is limited to people residing in Japan. Please obtain permission from your preferred academic supervisor for permission to use the remote learning system before applying.

Procedure for Applying for the Remote Learning Program

Students wishing to use the Remote Learning Program must contact the academic advisor they would like to receive supervision from before they submit their application form for the Program. The Remote Learning Program Application Form and all application materials (except the printout of the online application form) should be submitted to the Graduate Admissions Office before the specified deadline. Applicants will be notified of the decision regarding approval to use the Remote Learning Program after the application documents have been reviewed by the Graduate School.

Extended Enrollment System

In order to better meet the diverse needs of enrollees and expand opportunities for graduate-level learning and research, the Graduate Schools of Law, Letters, Informatics, Foreign Language Education and Research, Psychology (Psychology Major), East Asian Cultures, Governance, Health and Well-being offer a three-year course, in addition to the standard two-year Master's Degree Program. This program offers the following characteristics.

(2) Assignment of Classes by Year for the Three-year Course

The master's thesis is submittal in the third-year.

(3) Changing Courses after Enrollment

At the time enrollees become second-year students, they can request to switch from the three-year course to the two-year course if they satisfy the following conditions as designated by each Graduate School. If they do so, at the Graduate Schools of Law, Informatics, Psychology (Psychology Major), Governance, the course limit of their second-year will be 28 credits, and at the Graduate Schools of Letters, Foreign Language Education and Research, East Asian Cultures, Health and Well-being, the course limit of their second-year will be 30 credits.

Eligible students will be notified during the fall semester of their first-year (Enrollees from the fall semester: spring semester of their first-year) by the University's Information System. Please note that it is impossible to switch from the two-year course to the three-year course.

(4) Limit of Years Enrolled

Limit of years enrolled for both the two-year course and three-year course is 4 years.

(5) Graduation Requirements

The graduate requirements are the same for both the two-year and three-year courses. Students enrolled in the three-year course shall take three years to complete the same requirements as students enrolled in the two-year course. For more information, see the "Graduate School Guidelines".

(6) School Fees

If you change your attendance period of the Graduate School in the course of study, you must also pay the tuition of the 3rd grade at the beginning of the 2nd grade.

If you wish to apply for the three-year course under the Extended Enrollment System, select "Three-year Course" for the "Extended Enrollment" field on the Online Application. Your selection of either course will have no effect on the admission decision.

If you wish to switch courses after being admitted, inform the Graduate School Admissions Division by Spring enrollment: January 10(Fri), 2025.

Please note that applicants admitted under the University's February Examination are not able to switch courses prior to their enrollment.

Remote Learning System [For Ph.D. Degree Program]

In order to better meet the diverse needs of students enrolled in our Ph.D. program and to expand opportunities for learning and research, the Graduate School of Foreign Language Education has set up a remote learning system.

It is therefore possible for students who find commuting to university difficult due to work commitments or because they live far away to complete their Ph.D. degree program by taking courses online. However, it is not possible to complete the Japanese Language Education Specialist Training Course online because it includes participation in face-to-face classes.

Students who use the remote learning system can take classes from their home or workplace using an Internet-based application. Most classes can be taken remotely, with a few exceptions due to the nature of the content of the classes. Even the general research ability test (QE), the hearing session, and the final (oral) exam can be taken remotely.

There is no special entrance exam for those who wish to use the remote enrolment system. Instead, selection will be made using the existing (face-to-face) entrance examination. No quota is set for the remote learning system.

Use of the remote learning system is limited to people residing in Japan. Please obtain permission from your preferred academic advisor before applying.

For those who are exempted from the (foreign language) written examination, the entrance (oral) examination will be conducted remotely.

Procedure for Applying for Remote Learning Program

Students wishing to use the Remote Learning Program must contact the academic advisor they would like to receive supervision from before they submit their application form for the Program. The Remote Learning Program Application Form and all application materials (except the printout of the online application form) should be submitted to the Graduate Admissions Office before the specified deadline. Applicants will be notified of the decision regarding approval to use the Remote Learning Program after the application documents have been reviewed by the Graduate School.
