This course focuses on how to give an effective academic presentation in English. Through analysis of model presentations and practice, students will be able to present their own research topics clearly and persuasively at academic conferences. In the lessons, students will give advice to each other on their presentations, record and review their own performance for improvement, and receive detailed individual feedback from the instructor. The skills practiced in the course will help students develop their confidence in presentations in English.

- · Presenting your own research logically and clearly
- · Designing slides that accurately illustrate your research and data
- Using appropriate expressions and intonation
- · Using effective eye contact and gestures
